

After a July break, our monthly meetings returned on 8/13. We heard a report from Lori about upcoming events including the tag sale, restarting of our regular Sunday services, and an upcoming November special event, which will be talked about in other articles. We heard that while our budget should be at 50% at the end of July, our income actually came in at 52.85% - thanks for everyone who had helped out with this! And our expenses came in at 56.78% which included the cost of changing out the elevator's hydraulic oil for the first time ever. (It should be done every 10-15 years. The report on the removed oil was that, for its age, it was not in bad condition!) Hopefully the financial report for August will be positive even as we worship at the Granby UCC church for the month. We are looking forward to welcoming everyone back to Center Church on 9/7. We also heard that our investment income is doing well in spite of market issues and uncertainty. We have taken care of some issues raised by the building inspector, we have had our non-sanctuary carpets cleaned very nicely, and our boiler will be inspected on 8/19. We are very supportive of the upcoming tag sale since it is one of the major non-pledge contributors to our overall annual budget. Many thanks to the Activities Team and everyone who will be involved!! It does take all of us to keep our church functioning well. As the summer winds down, we hope that everyone had the chance to take some time "off" for vacation, to rest singing voices, including the staff/choir, and that all of us will come back in September refreshed and ready for the year ahead. From the Church Historian - September 2025

TEMPERANCE IN EARLY SOUTH HADLEY



Our Pastor 1835 - 1847

According to *Webster's Dictionary*, temperance means to moderate. The Bible states "Everything in moderation." This can mean, "in action, thought and or feeling." A more definitive meaning is "restraint." "Indulgence" is another. Mainly we adhere to the more popular meaning... "abstinence from the use of intoxicating drink!" This is where our early South Hadley villagers come in,

The Temperance Reformation produced "a great change in our town." Hard Cider was "as plentiful as water!" Most every household had a hand-press for grinding apples. Along with cider, soldiers returning from war, brought with them rum. In all, there was plenty of intoxicating drink to go around! The "average consumption of intoxicating liquor was three times as large as it had been when the Declaration of Independence was signed!" When the

village was settled there was a law that stated "no one should drink liquor after 9 p.m."

In 1835, Rev. Joseph Condit became "the first minister to refuse hard cider, brandy or elderberry wine." When he visited his parishioners "cake and cheese was offered in place of a hot toddy." At the time,

there was a custom of "drinking a man dry!" When company arrived, they were to drink "every drop within the premises!" It was Rev. Condit's sermons that "prepared the way for a Temperance Crusade." This movement called The Washingtonian Movement began in nearby Northampton. It was said that it "reformed 150,000 persons!" There were conventions held with delegates from South Hadley which helped to produce such a number. Total abstinence occurred here! Nearly everyone in town signed the following pledge: "This by our hand do sign, to drink no wine, nor whiskey hot, which makes the sot, nor fiery rum to turn our home into a hell where none can dwell. So now we



pledge perpetual hate to all that can intoxicate." The rhyme was printed on thick pieces of satin for everyone to wear.



Visiting Day in the Village

At this time, the Great Temperance Picnic was celebrated each year. The example spread into the late 1800s. The picnic was renamed Visiting Day. The certain day would be announced by the minister. This morphed into Old Home Day, which was celebrated in the summer, with a town wide gathering. It brought town's people and those who may have moved away together to celebrate! Much of the celebration was done without hard liquor present.

Day, they would ask the family "the state of their soul." "Have they been converted, do they spend time with the Bible, do they maintain family worship?" By looking after the welfare of each family the church played an important part in the moral survival of our town. South Hadley survives today with a healthy diverse population who still maintain the "pursuit of happiness and liberty and freedom for all" atmosphere!

Tell Me the Stories - September 2025

My last hymn article was in April, so this set of hymn writeups covers April – July.

An Outcast among Outcasts (NCH 201) was definitely a new hymn for us the first time we used it. Lori chose it specifically because of the connection to her sermon. It was written by one of the newer, younger authors in the hymnbook, Richard D. Leach. He wrote the text after a 1992 conference of the Hymn Society to bring attention to "members of minority groups or oppressed peoples." Born in 1953 in Maine, he attended Bowdoin College and then graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary. He is an ordained UCC minister who began writing hymns in 1987. He decided he wanted to tell Bible stories in a different way. The tune "Post Street" was composed by another "young'un" Daniel C. Damon, born in 1955. Richard asked him to compose it to go along with his text after that same Hymn Society's annual conference. The hymn was one of the featured ones in the society's presentation of the NCH in 1995. Damon usually pairs his compositions with his own texts and wants his hymns to be "simple and singable," but also pushing the edge of our faith as it is spoken and sung. Leach has two texts in the NCH but the tune was only used there once. CAC 11/10

Guide My Feet (NCH 497) is one of the many African-American spirituals in the NCH. A possible inspiration is listed as Hebrews 12:1-2. Apostle Paul suggested that "a life of discipleship" was like "running the race." Or perhaps it could also be about the "race to elude capture" while fleeing from slavery. Since they were forbidden to read or write, slaves found that singing was one way "to pass on religious tradition." Guide My Feet's text was preserved in a 1900 collection by W.L. James. Joyce F. Johnson arranged the tune by the same name for the NCH where she served as a hymnal committee member. She was an organist and music professor who taught at Spelman College in Atlanta for over 50+ years. She was also the organist in April 1968 as Martin Luther King "lay in state" at Spelman for 48 hours. The tune was only used once in the NCH. Johnson is affiliated with eight African-American spirituals, mostly through the arrangements which she did in 1992.

The third hymn is *God of the Ages* (NCH 592) or as we more readily know it *God of Our Fathers* (PH 433). The words for this hymn were written by Daniel C. Roberts, an American Episcopalian minister in 1876. Almost every published hymnal in this country includes the hymn. An Episcopal pastor in rural Brandon, VT, he wrote it to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and it was originally sung with the music of the old, Russian national anthem. It is the only hymn text that he wrote. On the 100th anniversary of our Constitution's adoption, the hymn text was chosen as the official hymn for the event and a new hymn tune was commissioned, and composed by William Warren, organist at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in NYC and was entitled "National Hymn." It is said that the addition of the trumpet fanfare also contributed to its popularity. Turns out that this hymn tune is the only one of Warren's to have lasted. If you set the two hymn versions side by side, you will see that the words have been somewhat updated, but the original meaning still holds today. *CAC* 2/09

Gracious Spirit, Holy Ghost (NCH 61) whose text was composed by Christopher Wordsworth in 1862 and was based on his original poem. He was the nephew of William Wordsworth, renowned poet. Christopher started out as a lecturer at Cambridge before becoming a clergyman in the Church of England, including finally a bishop. It is said that he composed his texts on "scraps of paper as he traveled" around England. He has three texts in the NCH. The tune "Anderson" was composed in

1985 as a new setting for the text. New tunes were composed during that time for older texts because it was felt that the texts were still "meaningful" but needed newer tunes. Jane M. Marshall, from Dallas TX, was a composer, author, and church music conductor. She graduated from SMU which gave her a Woman of Achievement in 1965. The tune was only used once in the NCH.

Enter, Rejoice and Come In (NCH 73) is another hymn that I have never before covered. It was composed by Louise Ruspini and is based on Psalm 100. Her work has been published in *Journey to Freedom*. The hymn became very popular in the 1970s as it was to be sung in unison but with any accompaniment, including guitar and was felt to be more accessible to everyone. It was harmonized by Louise for the NCH in 1993 and suggested chords were included. This is her only hymn text and tune in the NCH. It is a very short hymn consisting of five stanzas of one line, followed by a repeated refrain.

God of the Prophets (NCH 358, PH 470) was a text by Denis Wortman originally a seven-stanza poem, in 1884 for his 1860 class at the 100th anniversary of the New Brunswick Theological Seminary of the Reformed Church of America. (whew that is a mouthful!) Wortman, born in Hopewell NY, was a leader in the Dutch Reformed Church in this country. He served in four parishes and was head of their Ministerial Relief Fund before his 1922 death. He has just one text in the NCH. "Toulon" was an anonymous tune, named after the French city, published in the 1551 Genevan Psalter. That was developed because John Calvin did not think that "nonbiblical words should be used in singing." He did allow that hymn texts based on the 150 Hebrew Scriptures psalms were appropriate to sing! A setting for Psalm 124, it was later shortened for other texts. The tune appears in one other NCH hymn. the Day of New Beginnings (NCH 417) is the other of the collaborative hymns between Brian Wren and Carleton Young in the NCH. Wren wrote the text for a church in Oxford, England's 1978 New Year's Day service. Originally in a question/answer format, he revised it later to its current declarative form. He first published this text for a hymnal in 1983. Wren has also published "prose volumes" which reflect his theological work. Wren in affiliated with 14 other hymns in the NCH. Carlton Y The final hymn, *This is* oung, Wren's senior by ten years, composed the hymn tune "Beginnings" in 1987 for Wren's original text format, but ended the final stanza with a positive sounding chord (a dominant fifth!). My reference text says that "the harmonies are in the style of a 1930s Broadway ballad." I find that an interesting comment to make. Young served as a seminary faculty member in several American and English universities. He also served as a music director for churches in four U.S. states including Massachusetts. Young also had three other hymn tunes in the NCH. The tune was only used once here.
