Church Safety: TODAY, we will be shortening the worship service to go over our procedures for Church Safety.







The origins of this African-American spiritual have been traced to the area of Charleston, South Carolina, where it may have been sung as a closing hymn for worship. It is one of a number of devotional songs expressing the desire to attain the spiritual character of Jesus.
